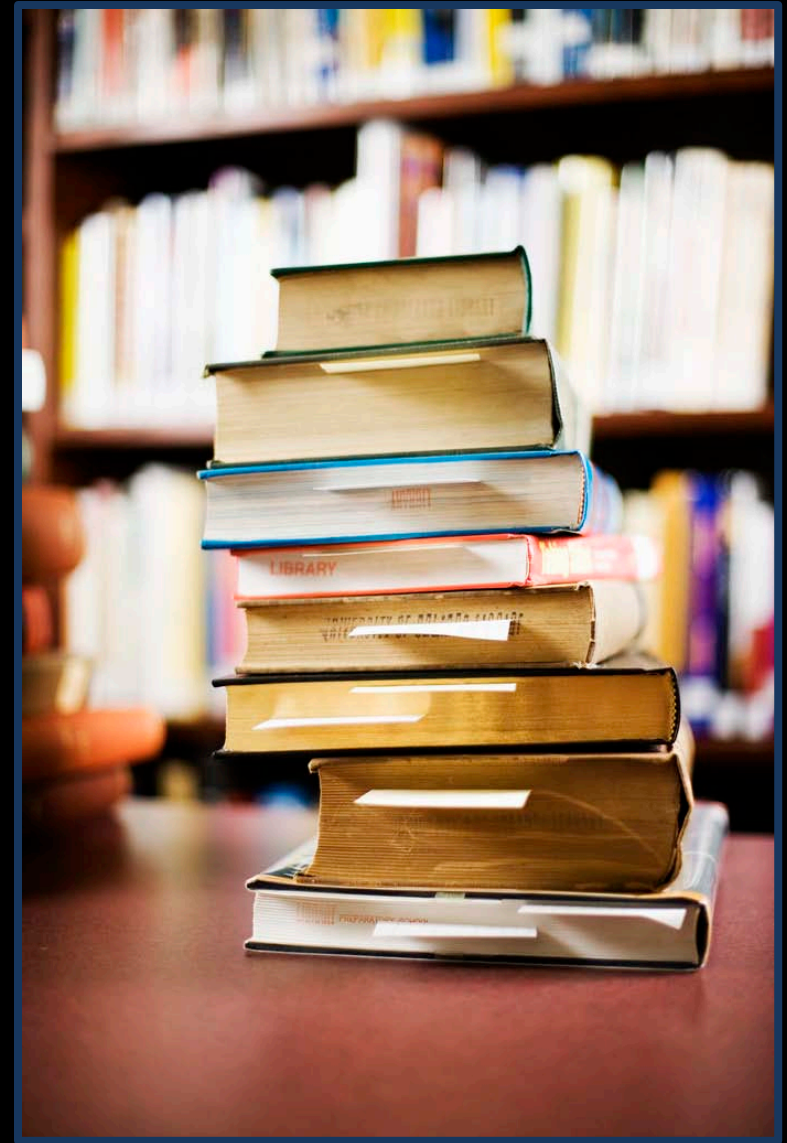

Definition of Terms

Academic Status

This term is used as an indication of a student's academic standing with the university. Students must maintain a cumulative grade point average (CGPA) of 2.0 to remain in good academic standing.

Academic Alert

A freshman is placed on academic alert the first term/semester the CGPA drops below a 2.0. To be removed from academic alert, the student must raise the CGPA to a minimum of 2.0 during the next period of enrollment. A student who does not raise the CGPA to at least the minimum 2.0 at the end of the next term/semester of enrollment is placed on academic probation.

Academic Probation

A student who is not classified as a freshman, or a student who is a freshman and has been on academic alert, is placed on academic probation at the end of any enrollment period in which the CGPA drops below a 2.0.

Academic Suspension

A student who, during a probationary fall or spring term/semester, fails to raise the CGPA to the minimum 2.0 or fails to make at least a 2.25 for the term/semester, is automatically suspended from UNT for one or more long terms/semesters.






